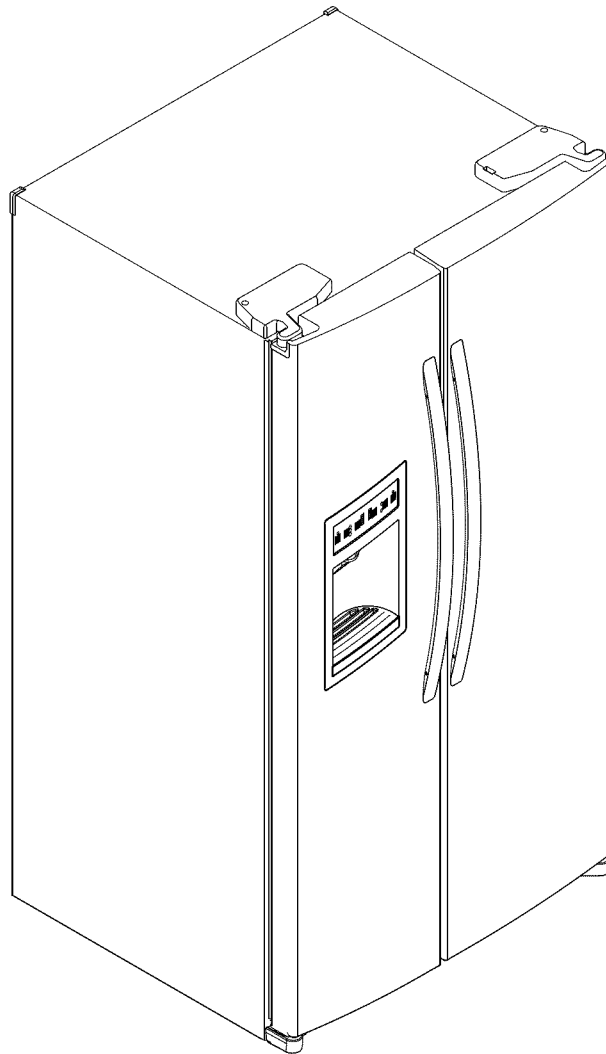

#### One Year Limited Warranty

When installed, operated and maintained according to all instructions supplied with the product, if this appliance fails due to a defect in material or workmanship within one year from the date of purchase, call 1-800-4-MY-HOME® to arrange for free repair.

If this appliance is used for other than private family purposes, this warranty applies for only 90 days from the date of purchase.

#### **This Warranty covers only defects in material and workmanship. Sears will NOT pay for:**

1. Expendable items that can wear out from normal use, including but not limited to filters, belts, light bulbs, and bags.
2. A service technician to instruct the user in correct product installation, operation or maintenance.
3. A service technician to clean or maintain this product.
4. Damage to or failure of this product if it is not installed, operated or maintained according to all instructions supplied with the product.

# IMPORTANT SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

This guide contains many important safety messages. Always **read and obey**.



This is the safety alert symbol. It alerts you to safety messages that inform you of hazards that can kill or hurt you or others, or cause damage to the product. All safety messages will be preceded by the safety alert symbol and the hazard signal word DANGER, WARNING, or CAUTION. These words mean:

## ⚠ WARNING

- NEVER unplug your refrigerator by pulling on the power cord. Always grip the plug firmly and pull it straight out from the outlet.
- Repair or replace immediately all electric service cords that have become frayed or otherwise damaged. Do not use a cord that shows cracks or abrasion damage along its length or at either the plug or connector end.
- When moving your refrigerator away from the wall, be careful not to roll over or damage it in any way.
- Do not crush or damage the water line.
- Do not store or use gasoline or other flammable vapors or liquids in the vicinity of this or any other appliance.
- Do not allow children to climb, stand or hang on the refrigerator doors or shelves in the refrigerator. They could damage the refrigerator and seriously injure themselves.
- Keep fingers out of 'pinch point' areas; clearances between the doors and cabinet are necessarily small. Be careful when you open the doors when children are in the area.
- Unplug your refrigerator before cleaning or making any repairs.  
**NOTE:** We strongly recommend that any servicing be performed by a qualified individual.
- Before replacing a burned-out light bulb, unplug the refrigerator or turn off power at the circuit breaker or fuse box in order to avoid contact with a live filament. (A burned-out light bulb may break when being replaced).  
**NOTE:** Setting either or both controls to the OFF position does not remove power to the light circuit.
- Do not store bottles in the freezer compartment, they may break when frozen, causing damage.

- The refrigerator-freezer should be positioned so that the supply plug is accessible for quick disconnection if an accident happens.
- For personal safety, this appliance must be properly grounded. Have the wall outlet and the circuit checked by a qualified electrician to make sure the outlet is properly grounded.
- This refrigerator must be properly installed in accordance with the 'Attention Installer' instructions that were taped to the front of the refrigerator.
- After your refrigerator is in operation, do not touch the cold surfaces in the freezer compartment when hands are damp or wet. Skin may adhere to the extremely cold surfaces.
- In refrigerator with automatic icemakers, avoid contact with the moving parts of the ejector mechanism, or with the heating element that releases the cubes. DO NOT place fingers or hands on the automatic ice making mechanism while the refrigerator is plugged in.
- DO NOT refreeze frozen foods which have thawed completely. The United States Department of Agriculture in Home and Garden Bulletin No. 69 says: "...You may safely refreeze frozen foods that have thawed if they still contain ice crystals or if they are still cold below 40 °F (4 °C)."  
"Thawed ground meats, poultry, or fish that have any off-odor or off-color should not be frozen and should not be eaten. Thawed ice cream should be discarded. If the odor or color of any food is poor or questionable, get rid of it. The food may be dangerous to eat."  
"Even partial thawing and refreezing reduces the eating quality of foods, particularly fruits, vegetables and prepared foods. The eating quality of red meats is affected less than that of many other foods. Use refrozen foods as soon as possible to save as much of their quality as you can."

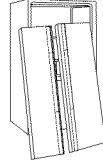
# ⚠ CAUTION

## GROUNDING REQUIREMENTS

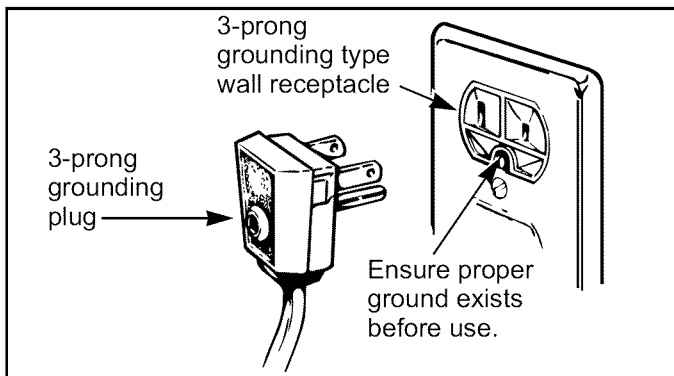
**IMPORTANT:** Please read carefully.

### TO CONNECT ELECTRICITY

#### ⚠ WARNING

##### Electrical Shock Hazard

**FOR PERSONAL SAFETY**, this appliance must be properly grounded. Have the wall outlet and the circuit checked by a qualified electrician to make sure the outlet is properly grounded.



### USE OF EXTENSION CORDS

Because of potential safety hazards under certain conditions, we strongly recommend against the use of an extension cord. However, if you still elect to use an extension cord, it is absolutely necessary that it be a UL-listed (in the United States), 3-wire grounding type appliance extension cord having a grounding type plug and outlet, and that the electrical rating of the cord be 15 amperes (minimum) and 120 volts.

Use of an extension cord will increase the clearance needed for the back of the refrigerator. If the supply cord is damaged, it must be replaced by the manufacturer or its service agent or a similarly qualified person in order to avoid any hazard.

### RECOMMENDED GROUNDING METHOD

The refrigerator should always be plugged into its own individual properly grounded electrical outlet rated for 115 volts, 60Hz, AC only and fused at 15 or 20 amperes. This provides the best performance and also prevents overloading house wiring circuits which could cause a fire hazard from overheated wires. It is recommended that a separate circuit serving only this appliance be provided. Use a receptacle which cannot be turned off with a switch or pull chain. Do not use an extension cord.

Where a standard two-prong wall outlet is encountered, it is your personal responsibility and obligation to have it replaced with a properly grounded three-prong wall outlet. Do not, under any circumstances, cut or remove the third (Ground) prong from the power cord.

**NOTE:** Before performing any type of installation, cleaning, or removing a light bulb, turn the control (Thermostat, Refrigerator Control or Freezer Control, depending on the model) to OFF and then disconnect the refrigerator from the electrical source. When you are finished, reconnect the refrigerator to the electrical source and reset the control (thermostat, refrigerator control or freezer control, depending on the model) to the desired setting.

# REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION

## ⚠ WARNING

### Excessive Weight Hazard

Use two or more people to move and install refrigerator.  
Failure to do so can result in back or other injury.

## UNPACKING YOUR REFRIGERATOR

Remove tape and any temporary labels from your refrigerator before using. Do not remove any warning type labels or the model and serial number label.

To remove any remaining tape or glue, rub the area briskly with your thumb. Tape or glue residue can also be easily removed by rubbing a small amount of liquid dish soap over the adhesive with your fingers. Wipe with warm water and dry.

Do not use sharp instruments, rubbing alcohol, flammable fluids or abrasive cleaners to remove tape or glue. These products can damage the surface of your refrigerator. For more information, see the **Important Safety Instructions** section.

Refrigerator shelves are installed in the shipping position.

Please reinstall shelves according to your individual storage needs.

## ⚠ WARNING

### When Moving Your Refrigerator:

Your refrigerator is heavy. When moving the refrigerator for cleaning or service, be sure to protect the floor. Always pull the refrigerator straight out when moving it. Do not wiggle or walk the refrigerator when trying to move it, as floor damage could occur.

## ⚠ WARNING



### Explosion Hazard

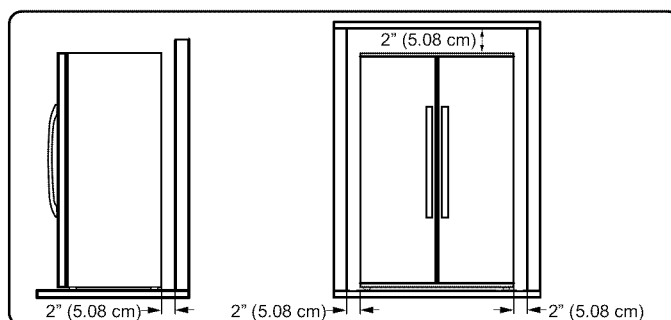
Keep flammable materials and vapors, such as gasoline, away from refrigerator.

Failure to do so can result in death, explosion or fire.

## INSTALLATION

1. Avoid placing unit near heat sources, direct sunlight or moisture.
2. To minimize noise and vibration, the refrigerator **MUST** be installed on a solidly constructed floor.
3. Carpeting and soft tile surfaces are not recommended.
4. **NEVER** install the refrigerator on a platform or a weakly supported structure.
5. Install this appliance in an area where the temperature is between 41 °F (5 °C) and 110 °F (43 °C). If the temperature around the appliance is too low or high, cooling ability may be adversely affected.

**NOTE:** For proper air circulation, best cooling and energy consumption results, maintain a minimum distance of 2 inches (5.08cm) from adjacent items and surfaces.



## ⚠ WARNING

- Be careful when you work with hinge, base grille, stopper, etc. You may be injured.
- Do not put hands or metal sticks into air vents, base grille or bottom of the refrigerator. You may be injured or receive an electrical shock.

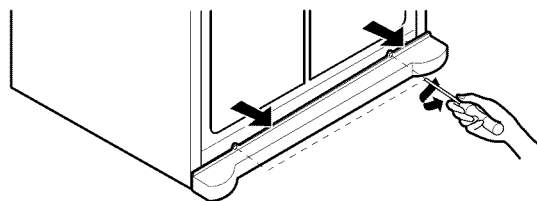
## BASE GRILLE INSTALLATION

### To install or replace base grille:

1. Remove the 2 screws from the bottom front part of refrigerator.
2. Place base grille into position and insert and tighten screws.

### To remove the base grille

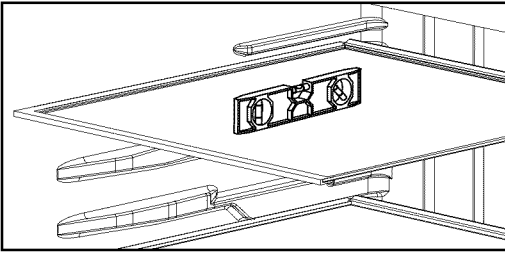
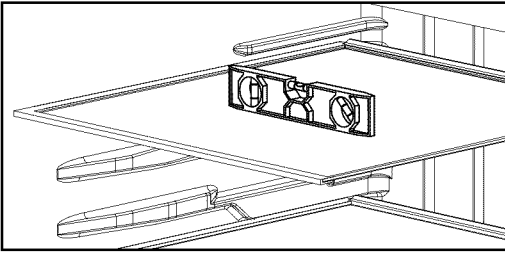
1. Open the doors. (Refrigerator and Freezer)
2. Once doors are open, remove screws from base grille. Remove base grille and set safely aside.
3. Reattach screws to the base of refrigerator.



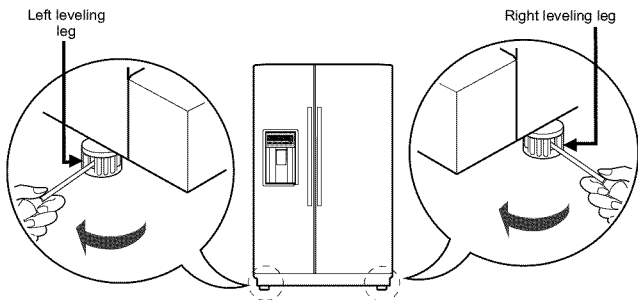
# REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION

## LEVELING THE REFRIGERATOR DOOR

Place level on refrigerator shelf as shown below.



If your refrigerator is not level, insert a flat blade screwdriver into the grooves of the leveling legs (shown in picture below). Rotate legs clockwise to raise or counterclockwise to lower the front of the refrigerator.



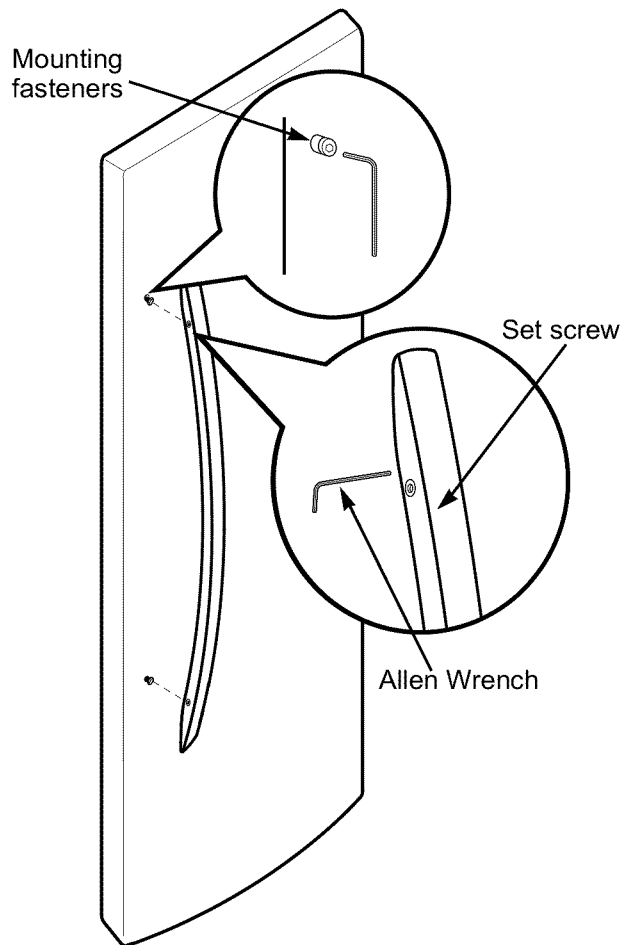
Raise the front of the refrigerator enough so the doors close freely when opened halfway. The refrigerator should slope  $\frac{1}{4}$ " (6.35 mm) to  $\frac{1}{2}$ " (0.127 mm) from front to back.

## HANDLE REMOVAL (TYPE 1) (Identify your handle type)

**NOTE:** It is ALWAYS recommended to remove the refrigerator doors when it is necessary to move the refrigerator through a narrow opening. If necessary, follow the directions below to remove the door handles.

- Loosen the set screws with a  $\frac{3}{32}$ " (2.38 mm) Allen wrench and remove the handle.

**NOTE:** If the handle mounting fasteners need to be tightened or moved, use a  $\frac{1}{4}$ " (6.35 mm) Allen wrench.



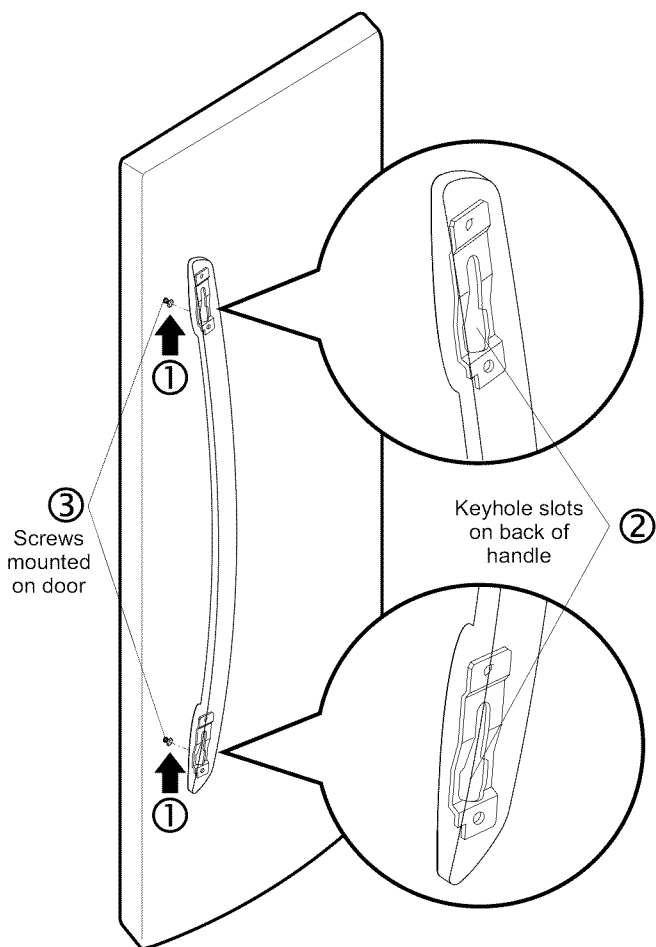
# REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION

## HANDLE REMOVAL (TYPE 2)

- Grasp the handle tightly with both hands and slide the handle up ① (this may require some force).
- The keyhole slots ② on the back of the handle allow the handle to separate from the mounting screws ③.
- Then pull the handle towards you.

**⚠ CAUTION:** Use extreme care to prevent damage if using a rubber mallet to remove the handles.

**⚠ CAUTION:** It may take some force to assemble or disassemble the handles.



## ⚠ WARNING

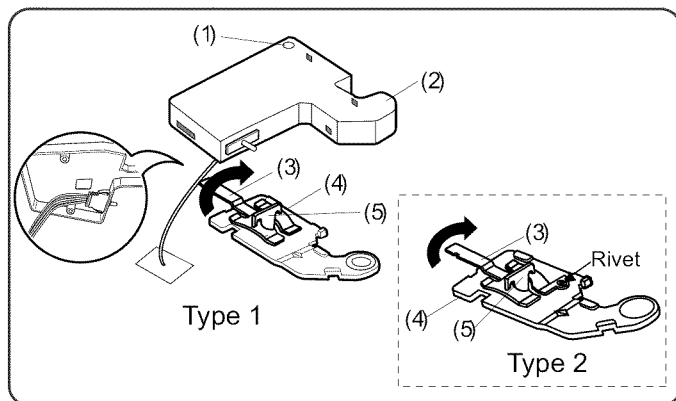
### Electric Shock Hazard

- Disconnect electrical supply to the refrigerator before installing. Failure to do so could result in death or serious injury.
- Do not put hands or feet or other objects into the air vents, base grille, or bottom of the refrigerator. You may be injured or receive an electrical shock.
- Be careful when you work with the hinge, base grille, and stopper. You may be injured.

## REMOVING AND REPLACING REFRIGERATOR DOORS

Before removing the doors, remove the Base Grille. See **BASE GRILLE INSTALLATION** for reference.

To remove the right (refrigerator) door:



1. Open the door. Remove the top hinge cover screw (1).
2. Use a flat blade screwdriver to pry back the hooks (not shown) on the cabinet underside of the cover (2). Lift up the cover.
3. Rotate the hinge lever (3) clockwise. Lift the top hinge (4) free of the hinge lever latch (5).

**NOTE:** Regardless of the type of hinge lever, removal process is the same

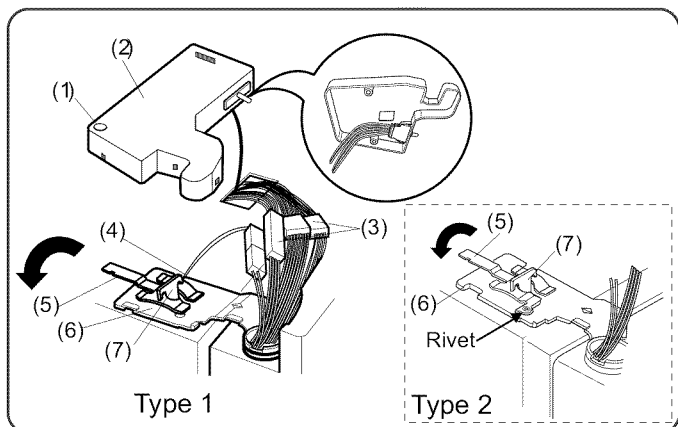
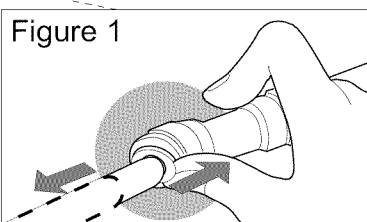
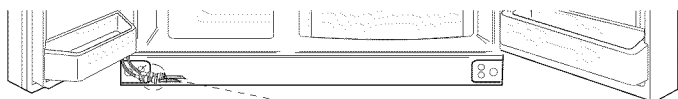
4. Lift the door from the lower hinge pin.
5. Place the door, inside facing up, on a nonscratching surface.

**⚠ CAUTION:** When lifting the hinge free of the latch, be careful that the door does not fall forward.

# REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION

## Removing the left (freezer) door with water line connection.

- Pull up the water feed tube while pressing area (Figure 1) as shown in the figure below.
- **NOTE:** If a tube end is deformed or abraded, trim the part away. Disconnecting the tube under the door causes about 0.13 gallons (0.5 liters) water to flow out. Put a large container at end of tube to prevent water from draining onto the floor.



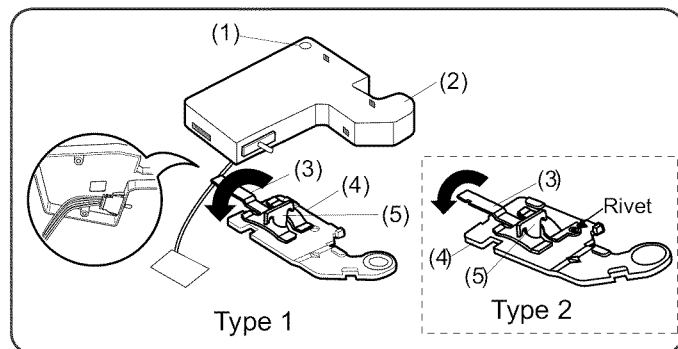
1. Open the door. Remove the top hinge cover screw (1).
2. Use a flat blade screwdriver to pry back the hooks (not shown) on the cabinet underside of the cover (2). Lift up the cover.
3. Disconnect all the wire harnesses (3).
4. Remove the grounding screw (4).
5. Rotate hinge lever (5) counterclockwise. Lift the top hinge (6) free of the hinge lever latch (7).

**NOTE:** Regardless of the type of hinge lever, removal process is the same.

**CAUTION:** When lifting the hinge free of the latch, be careful that the door does not fall forward.

6. Lift the door from the lower hinge pin being careful to pull the water lines through the lower hinge pin.
7. Place the door, inside facing up, on a nonscratching surface.

## Reinstalling the right (Refrigerator) door



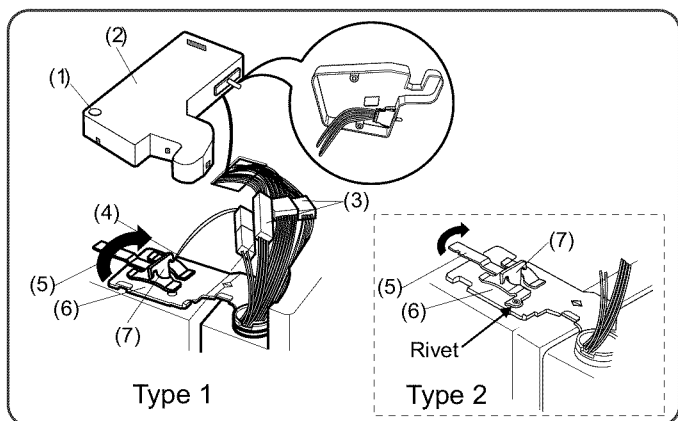
1. Place the door onto the lower hinge pin.
2. Fit top hinge (4) over hinge lever latch (5) into place. Rotate lever (3) counterclockwise to secure hinge.

**NOTE:** Regardless of the type of hinge lever, removal process is the same.

3. Hook tab on switch side of corner under edge of wire opening in cabinet top. Position cover (2) into place. Insert and tighten cover screw (1).

# REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION

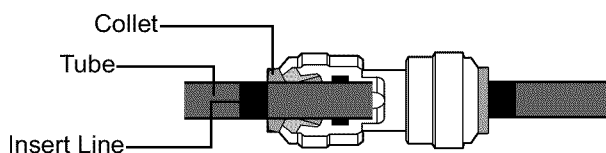
## Reinstalling the left (Freezer) door



1. Feed the water tubes through the lower hinge pin and place the door onto the lower hinge pin.
2. Fit top hinge (6) over hinge lever latch (7) and into place. Rotate lever (5) clockwise to secure hinge

**NOTE:** Regardless of the type of hinge lever, removal process is the same.

3. Install the grounding screw (4) and connect all the wire harnesses (3).
4. Hook tab on door switch side of cover (2) under edge of wire opening in cabinet top. Position cover into place. Insert and tighten cover screw (1).
5. Reconnect the water tubes by inserting the tubes into the connectors.



## DOOR ALIGNMENT

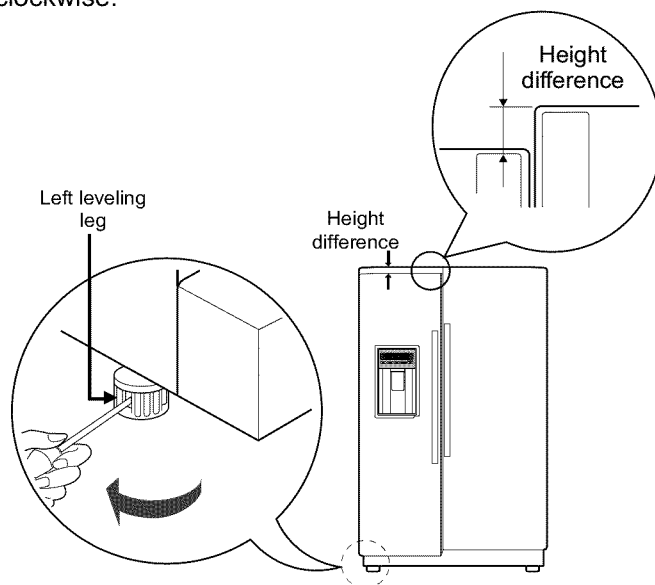
Before adjust the doors, remove the base grille. See **BASE GRILLE INSTALLATION** for reference.

First select your adjusting tool, it could vary.

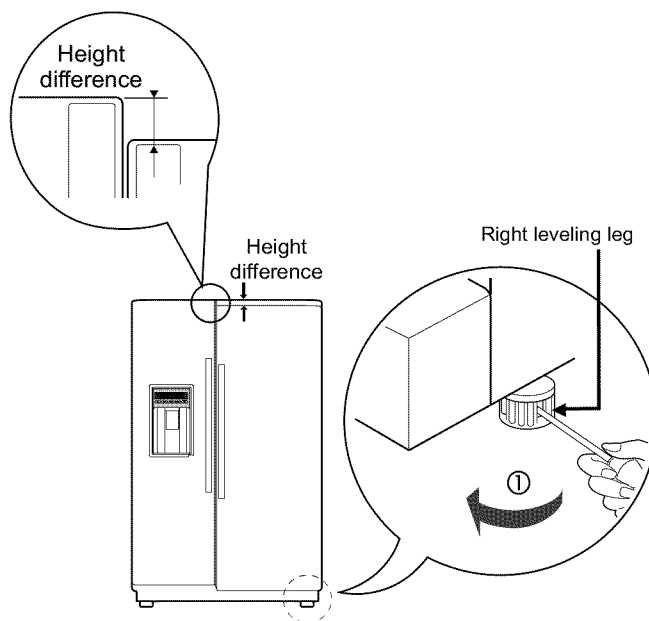
### Type 1

#### Adjusting tool: Flat blade screwdriver

If the freezer compartment door is lower than the refrigerator compartment door, make them level by inserting flat blade screwdriver into the groove of the left leveling leg and rotating it clockwise.



If the freezer compartment door is higher than the refrigerator compartment door, make them level by inserting flat blade screwdriver into the groove of the right leveling leg and rotating it clockwise.

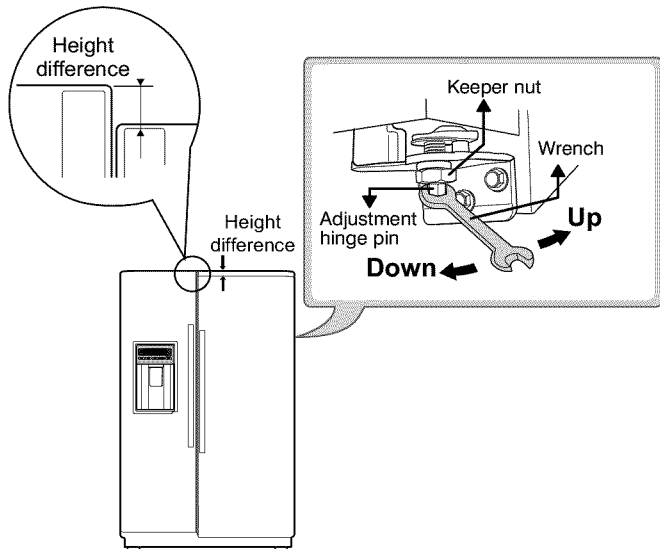


# REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION

## Type 2

**Adjusting tools: Wrench 5/16" (8 mm) and Wrench 3/4" (19 mm)**

Adjust the level when the refrigerator door is lower than the freezer door during the installation of the refrigerator.



Using a 3/4" (19 mm) wrench, turn the keeper nut clockwise to loosen the keeper nut.

Using a 5/16" (8 mm) wrench, turn the adjustment hinge pin clockwise or counterclockwise to level the refrigerator and freezer door.

After setting the level door, turn the keeper nut counterclockwise to tighten.

Do not overtight the door adjustment screw. The hinge pin can be pulled out. (Adjustable range of height is a maximum of 1/2" (1.27 cm)).

## AFTER LEVELING THE DOOR HEIGHT

Make sure the front leveling legs are completely touching the floor.

# REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION

## CONNECTING THE WATER LINE

**NOTE:** Water line installation is needed when the Automatic Ice Maker and/or Water Dispenser features are available on your product.

## BEFORE YOU BEGIN

This water line installation is not warranted by the refrigerator or icemaker manufacturer or seller. Follow these instructions carefully to minimize the risk of expensive water damage.

Water hammer (water banging in the pipes) in house plumbing can cause damage to refrigerator parts and lead to water leakage or flooding. Call a qualified plumber to correct water hammer before installing the water supply line to the refrigerator

To prevent burns and product damage, do not hook up the water line to the hot water line.

If you use your refrigerator before connecting the water line, make sure the icemaker power switch is in the **O (off)** position.

Do not install the icemaker tubing in areas where temperatures fall below freezing.

When using any electrical device (such as a power drill) during installation, be sure the device is double-insulated or grounded in a manner to prevent the hazard of electric shock, or is battery-powered.

All installations must be in accordance with local plumbing code requirements.

**NOTE:** Wear eye protection.

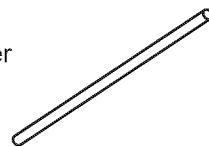
- **If a reverse osmosis water filtration system** is connected to your cold water supply, the water line installation is not warranted by the refrigerator or icemaker manufacturer or seller. Follow next instruction carefully to minimize the risk of expensive water damage.
- **If a reverse osmosis water filtration system** is connected to your cold water supply, the water pressure to the reverse osmosis system needs to be a minimum of 40 to 60 PSI (2.8 kg·f/cm<sup>2</sup> ~ 4.2 kg·f/cm<sup>2</sup>, less than 2~3 sec to fill a cup of 7 oz capacity).

If the water pressure from the reverse osmosis system is less than 21 PSI (1.5 kg·f/cm<sup>2</sup>, more than 4 sec to fill a cup of 7 oz capacity):

- Check to see whether the sediment filter in the reverse osmosis system is blocked. Replace the filter if necessary.
- Allow the storage tank on the reverse osmosis system to refill after heavy usage.
- If the issue about water pressure from reverse osmosis remains, call a licensed, qualified plumber.

## WHAT YOU WILL NEED

- **Copper Tubing**, 1/4" (6.35 mm) outer diameter to connect the refrigerator to the water supply. Be sure both ends of the tubing are cut square.

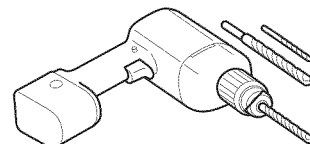


To determine how much tubing you need, measure the distance from the water valve on the back of the refrigerator to the water supply pipe. Then add 8 feet (2.4 m). Be sure there is sufficient extra tubing (about 8 feet [2.4 m] coiled into 3 turns of about 10" [25 cm] diameter) to allow the refrigerator to move out from the wall after installation.

Be sure that the kit you select allows at least 8 feet (2.4 m) as described above.

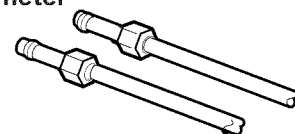
- **A cold water supply.** The water pressure must be between 20 and 120 PSI (1.4 bar and 8.2 bar) on models without a water filter and between 40 and 120 PSI (2.8 bar and 8.2 bar) on models with a water filter.

- **Power drill.**
- **1/2" (12.7 mm) or Adjustable Wrench.**

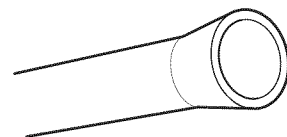


- **Flat head-and Phillips-screwdrivers.**

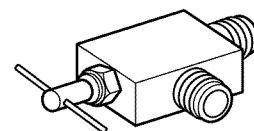
- **Two 1/4" (6.35 mm) outer diameter compression nuts and 2 Ferrules (sleeves)** to connect the copper tubing to the shutoff valve and the refrigerator water valve.



- If your existing copper water line has a flared fitting at the end, you will need an **adapter** (available at plumbing supply stores) to connect the water line to the refrigerator OR you can cut off the flared fitting with a tube cutter and then use a compression fitting.



- **Shutoff valve to connect to the cold water line.** The shutoff valve should have a water inlet with a minimum inside diameter of 5/32"



(3.96 mm) at the point of connection to the COLD WATER LINE. Saddle-type shutoff valves are included in many water supply kits. Before purchasing, make sure a saddle-type valve complies with your local plumbing codes.

# REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION

## INSTALLATION INSTRUCTIONS

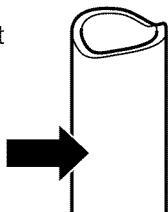
Install the shutoff valve on the nearest frequently used drinking water line. Only connect to the potable water provision.

### 1. SHUTOFF THE MAIN WATER SUPPLY

Turn on the nearest faucet to relieve the pressure on the line.

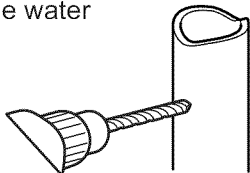
### 2. CHOOSE THE VALVE LOCATION

Choose a location for the valve that is easily accessible. It is best to connect into the side of a vertical water pipe. When it is necessary to connect into a horizontal water pipe, make the connection to the top or side, rather than at the bottom, to avoid drawing off any sediment from the water pipe.



### 3. DRILL THE HOLE FOR THE VALVE

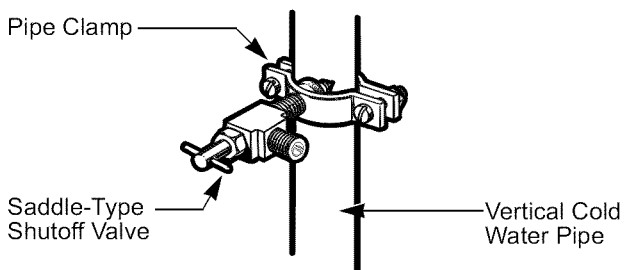
Drill a 1/4" (6.35 mm) hole in the water pipe (even if using a self-piercing valve) using a sharp bit. Remove any burrs resulting from drilling the hole in the pipe. Take care not to allow water to drain into the drill. Failure to drill a 1/4" (6.35 mm) hole may result in reduced ice production or smaller cubes.



**NOTE:** The hookup line cannot be white, plastic tubing NDA tubing #49595 or 49499 or Cross Link Polyethylene (PEX) tubing.

### 4. FASTEN THE SHUTOFF VALVE

Fasten the shutoff valve to the cold water pipe with the pipe clamp.

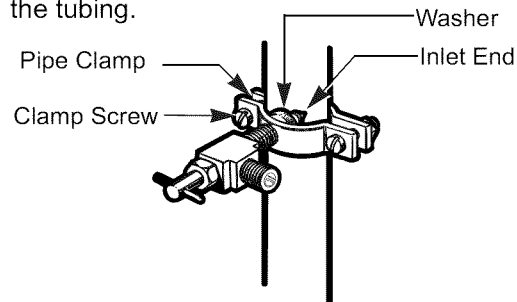


**NOTE:** Commonwealth of Massachusetts Plumbing Codes 248CMR shall be adhered to. Saddle valves are illegal and use is not permitted in Massachusetts. Consult with your licensed plumber.

### 5. TIGHTEN THE PIPE CLAMP

Tighten the clamp screws until the sealing washer begins to swell.

**NOTE:** Do not overtighten or you may crush the tubing.



### 6. ROUTE THE TUBING

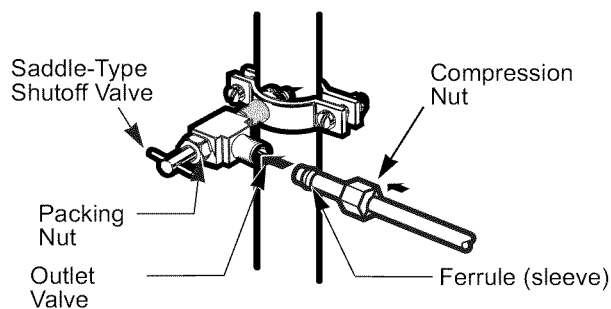
Route the tubing between the cold water line and the refrigerator.

Route the tubing through a hole drilled in the wall or floor (behind the refrigerator or adjacent base cabinet) as close to the wall as possible.

**NOTE:** Be sure there is sufficient extra tubing [about 8 feet (244 mm) coiled into 3 turns of about 10" (25 cm) diameter] to allow the refrigerator to move out from the wall after installation.

### 7. CONNECT THE TUBING TO THE VALVE

Place the compression nut and ferrule (sleeve) for copper tubing onto the end of the tubing and connect it to the shutoff valve. Make sure the tubing is fully inserted into the valve. Tighten the compression nut securely.



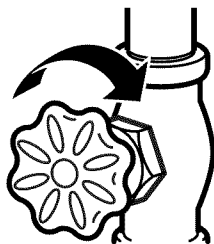

# REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION

## 8. FLUSH OUT THE TUBING

Turn the main water supply on and flush out the tubing until the water is clear.

Shut the water off at the water valve after about one quart of water has been flushed through the tubing.

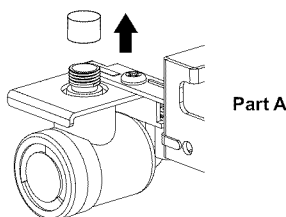


## 9. CONNECT THE TUBING TO THE REFRIGERATOR

### NOTES:

- Before making the connection to the refrigerator, be sure the refrigerator power cord is not plugged into the wall outlet.
- If your refrigerator does not have a water filter, we recommend installing one. If your water supply has sand or particles that could clog the screen of the refrigerator's water valve, install the filter in the water line near the refrigerator.
- Do not use old hoses; only use new hoses provided by the manufacturer. For more information call 1-800-4-MY-HOME.

1. Remove the plastic flexible cap from the refrigerator connection.
2. Place the compression nut and ferrule (sleeve) onto the end of the tubing. (See figure 1)
3. Insert the end of the tubing into the connection as far as possible. While holding the tubing, tighten the fitting.



**⚠ CAUTION:** Review that leaks are not occurring in the water line.

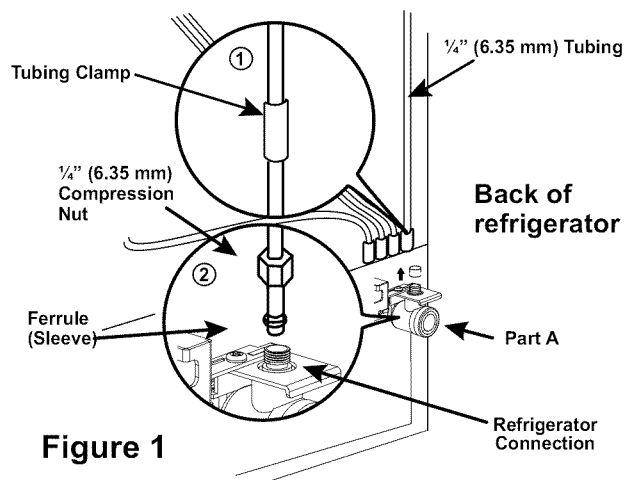


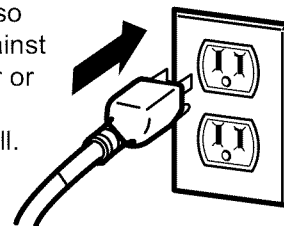

Fasten the tubing into the tubing clamp attached to the back of the refrigerator.

First, loosen the screw fastening the clamp. Next, insert the tubing in the groove. Finally, re-fasten the screw.

## 10. PLUG IN THE REFRIGERATOR

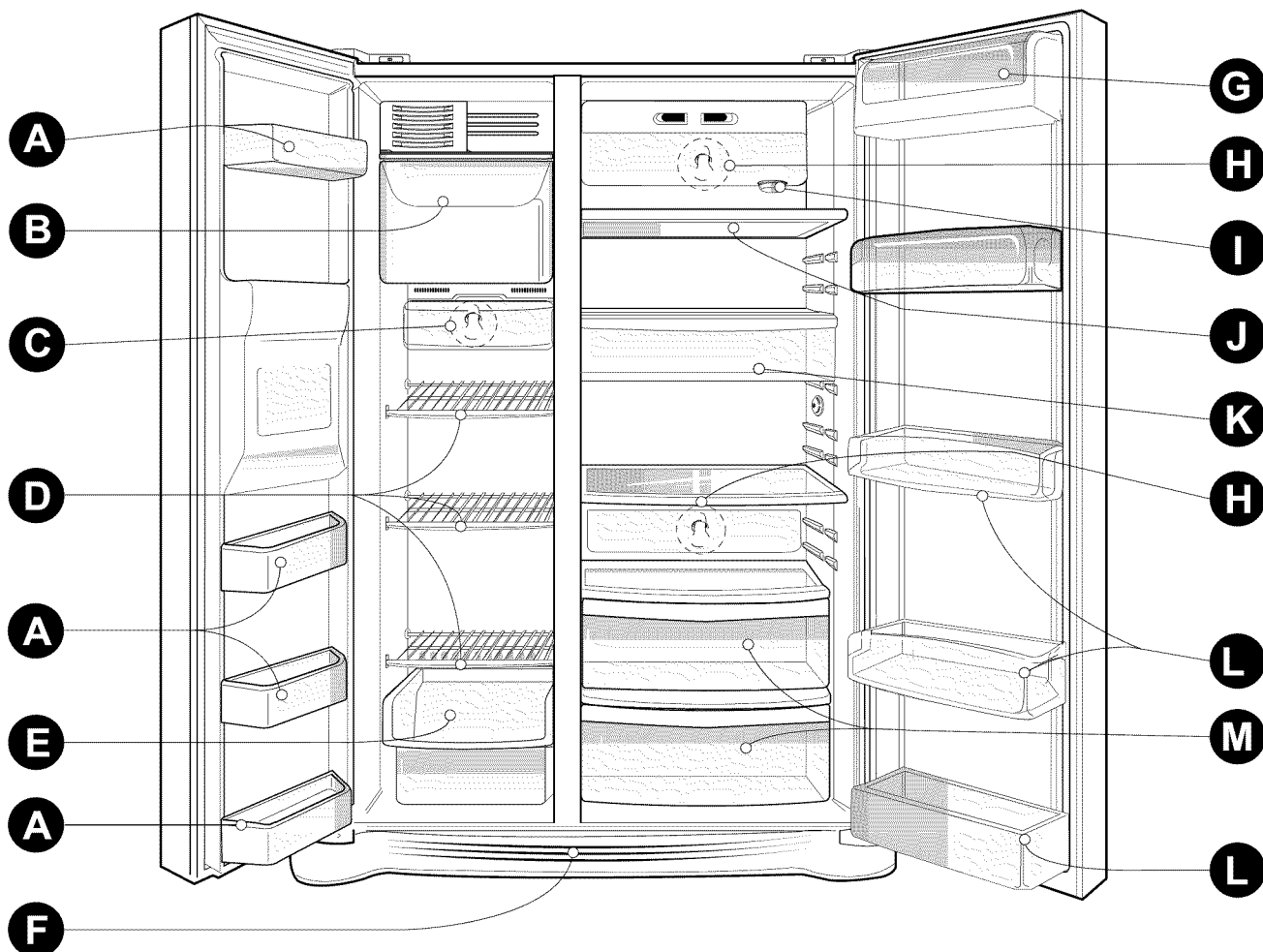
Arrange the coil of tubing so that it does not vibrate against the back of the refrigerator or against the wall. Push the refrigerator back to the wall.



## 11. START THE ICE MAKER

Set the icemaker power switch to the ON position. The icemaker will not begin to operate until it reaches its operating temperature of 15 °F (-9 °C) or below. It will then begin operation automatically if the icemaker power switch is in the I (on) position.

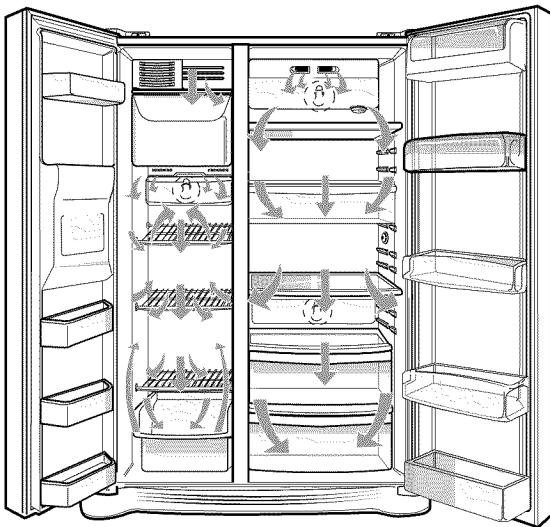

# USING YOUR REFRIGERATOR

## ENSURING PROPER AIR CIRCULATION

In order to ensure proper temperatures, air must flow between the refrigerator and freezer sections. As shown in the illustration below, cool air enters through the refrigerator of the freezer section and moves up. Most of the air then flows through the freezer section vents and recirculates under the freezer floor. The rest of the air enters the refrigerator section through the top vent.

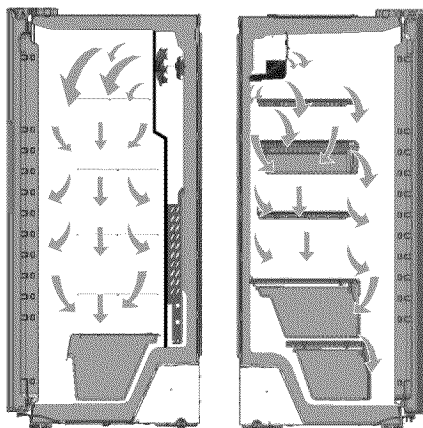


- **Do not block any of these vents** with food packages. If the vents are blocked, airflow will be interrupted and temperature and moisture problems may occur.

### IMPORTANT:

Because air circulates between both sections, any odors formed in one section will transfer to the other. You must thoroughly clean both sections to eliminate odors. To prevent odor transfer and drying out food, wrap or cover foods tightly. (See the Food Storage Guide section for details.)

**Note:** If you close the refrigerator door, you may see the freezer door open and close again due to pressure from internal air flow.



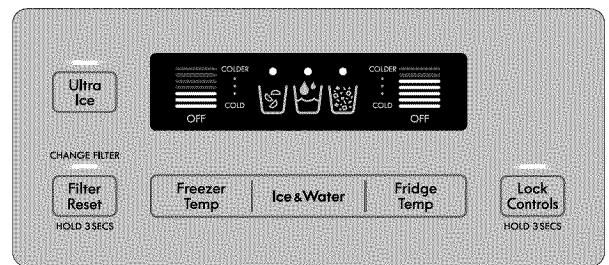
## NEXT

1. Clean your refrigerator thoroughly and wipe off dust accumulated during shipping.
2. Install accessories such as ice cube bin, drawers, shelves, etc., in their proper places. They are packed together to prevent possible damage during shipment.
3. Let your refrigerator run for at least 2 or 3 hours before putting food in it. Check the flow of cold air in the freezer compartment to ensure proper cooling. Your refrigerator is now ready for use.

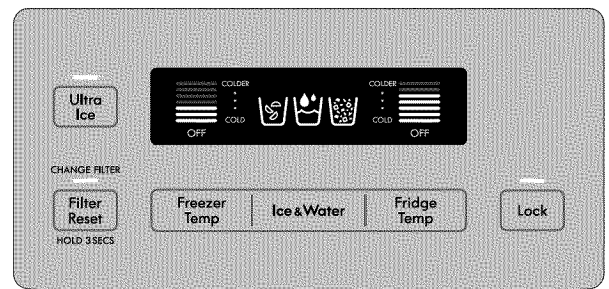

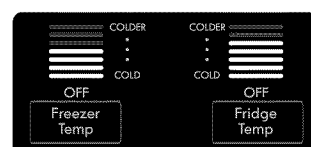


## REFRIGERATOR AND FREEZER CONTROLS:

It's recommended to maintain the initial temperatures setting (middle) by pressing Fridge Temp Graphic and Freezer Temp Graphic.

**NOTE:** When changing control settings, wait 24 hours before making additional adjustments. After 24 hours, adjust the compartments temperatures as desired. The more lit bars, the colder the refrigerator and freezer will be. See figure 1 for reference.

# USING YOUR REFRIGERATOR

## Display Off Mode

The display lights up and stays lit when the refrigerator is plugged in for 20 seconds. All the display lights go off except the dispenser icon selected (crush, water or cube), and the display only lights when door is opened or display button is pressed. The display will turn off 20 seconds after the door is closed or the display button is pressed. You can change the display to always ON by pressing the "Freezer Temp" and "Ultra Ice" buttons at the same time for 5 seconds. A tone will sound indicating that the display is ON (Display Off Mode Deactivated). To return to Display Off Mode, press the same two buttons for 5 seconds.

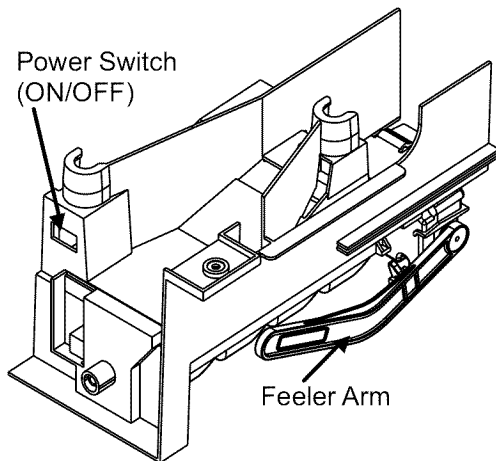
## Icemaker operation

### ⚠ WARNING

#### Personal Injury Hazard

Avoid contact with the moving parts of the ejector mechanism, or with the heating element that releases the cubes. DO NOT place fingers or hands on the automatic icemaking mechanism while the refrigerator is plugged in.

**A newly-installed refrigerator may take 12 to 24 hours to begin making ice.**



The icemaker will produce 8 cubes per cycle, approximately 70-80 cubes in a 24-hour period, depending on freezer compartment temperature, room temperature, number of door openings and other operating conditions.

If the refrigerator is used before the water connection is made to the icemaker, set the power switch to **OFF**.

When the refrigerator has been connected to the water the icemaker will fill with water when it cools to freezing. A newly-installed refrigerator may take 12 to 24 hours to begin making ice cubes.

Throw away the first few batches of ice to allow the water line to clear.

Be sure nothing interferes with the sweep of the feeler arm.

When the bin fills to the level of the feeler arm, the icemaker will stop producing ice.

It is normal for several cubes to be stuck together.

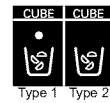
If ice is not used frequently, old ice cubes will become cloudy, taste stale, and shrink.



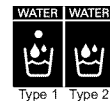
#### ICE&WATER (Identify your icon type)

You can select water or ice.

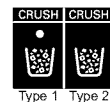
- Select Water, Crushed Ice or Cubed Ice by pressing this button to the selection desired. The Water, Crushed Ice or Cubed Ice icon will light up to indicate selection.



Light the cubed ice lamp by pressing the selection button. If you have type 1, the dot on icon will be illuminated, but if you have type 2, the icon will be illuminated.



Light the water lamp by pressing the selection button. If you have type 1, the dot on icon will be illuminated, but if you have type 2, the icon will be illuminated.



Light the crushed ice lamp by pressing the selection button. If you have type 1, the dot on icon will be illuminated, but if you have type 2, the icon will be illuminated.

To dispense water or ice, gently push your cup against the dispenser pad.

**NOTE:** Hold your cup in place for a couple of seconds after dispensing ice or water so the last few drops go in your cup instead of on the floor.

## Door Alarm

When either refrigerator or freezer door is left open for more than 60 seconds, an alarm will sound 5 times at 30 seconds intervals to let you know the door is open.

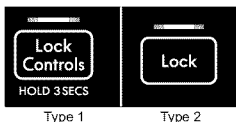
Please contact the local service center if warning tone continues to sound even after closing the door.

# USING YOUR REFRIGERATOR



## ULTRA ICE

Press this button once to activate increased ice making function. The ULTRA ICE icon on the display panel will illuminate when activated. The Ultra Ice function runs the freezer compartment at the coldest settings for a 24 hour period to increase ice making. Press the button again to cancel the Ultra Ice function.



## LOCK CONTROLS / LOCK

The LOCK CONTROLS/LOCK button deactivates the temperature controls and dispenser functions.

Press and hold this button for 3 seconds or until the Lock indicator light is lit.

To disable the Lock function, press and hold the LOCK CONTROLS/LOCK button for 3 seconds or until the Lock indicator light is off.

## FILTER RESET (filter replacement cycle)

HOLD 3 SECS

- There is a replacement indicator light for the water filter cartridge on the dispenser.
- Water filter usually needs replacement once every six months.
- Filter light comes on and blinks to let you know when to replace filter.
- After replacing filter, press and hold Filter Reset button for 3 seconds to turn off filter status light.

## ADJUSTING CONTROL SETTINGS

Give the refrigerator time to cool down completely before making final adjustments. It is best to wait 24 hours before doing this. The initial settings mentioned in **CONTROL PANEL FEATURES** section should be correct for normal household refrigerator use. The controls are set correctly when milk or juice is as cold as you like and when ice cream is firm.

The refrigerator control functions as the thermostat for the entire appliance (refrigerator and freezer sections). The colder the setting, the longer the compressor will run to keep the temperature colder. The freezer control adjusts the cold air flow from the freezer to the refrigerator. Setting the freezer control to a lower temperature keeps more cold air in the freezer compartment to make it colder.

If you need to adjust temperatures in the refrigerator or freezer, start by adjusting the refrigerator. Then wait 24 hours before checking the freezer temperature. If it is too warm or too cold, then adjust the freezer control.

Use the settings listed in the chart below as a guide.

**Always remember to wait at least 24 hours between adjustments.**

# USING YOUR REFRIGERATOR

## FOOD STORAGE GUIDE

Wrap or store food in the refrigerator in airtight and moisture-proof material unless otherwise noted. This prevents food odor and taste transfer throughout the refrigerator. For dated products, check date code to ensure freshness.

Items	How to Store
<b>Butter or margarine</b>	▶ Keep opened butter in a covered dish or closed compartment. When storing an extra supply, wrap in freezer packaging and freeze.
<b>Cheese</b>	▶ Store in the original wrapping until you are ready to use it. Once opened, rewrap tightly in plastic wrap or aluminum foil.
<b>Milk</b>	▶ Wipe milk cartons. For best storage, place milk on interior shelf, not on door shelf.
<b>Eggs</b>	▶ Store in original carton or Utility Bin (Optional) on interior shelf, not on door shelf.
<b>Fruit</b>	▶ Wash, let dry, and store in refrigerator in plastic bags or in the crisper. Do not wash or hull berries until you are ready to use them. Sort and keep berries in their original container in a crisper, or store in a loosely closed paper bag on a refrigerator shelf.
<b>Leafy vegetables</b>	▶ Remove store wrapping and trim or tear off bruised and discolored areas. Wash in cold water and drain. Place in plastic bag or plastic container and store in crisper.
<b>Vegetables with skins (carrots, peppers)</b>	▶ Place in plastic bags or plastic container and store in crisper.
<b>Fish</b>	▶ Use fresh fish and shellfish the same day purchased.
<b>Leftovers</b>	▶ Cover leftovers with plastic wrap or aluminum foil. Plastic containers with tight lids can also be used.

## STORING FROZEN FOOD

**NOTE:** For further information about preparing food for freezing or food storage times, check a freezer guide or a reliable cookbook.

### Packaging

Successful freezing depends on correct packaging. When you close and seal the package, it must not allow air or moisture in or out. If it does, you could have food odor and taste transfer throughout the refrigerator and also dry out frozen food.

### Packaging recommendations:

- Rigid plastic containers with "tight-fitting lids"
- Straight-sided canning/freezing jars
- Heavy-duty aluminum foil
- Plastic-coated paper
- Non-permeable plastic wraps
- Specied freezer-grade self-sealing plastic bags

Follow package or container instructions for proper freezing methods.

### Do not use

- Bread wrappers
- Non-polyethylene plastic containers
- Containers without tight lids
- Wax paper or wax-coated freezer wrap
- Thin, semi-permeable wrap

**⚠ CAUTION:** Do not keep beverage cans or plastic food containers in the freezer compartment. They may break if they freeze.

### Freezing

Your freezer will not quick-freeze any large quantity of food. Do not put more unfrozen food into the freezer than will freeze within 24 hours [no more than 2 to 3 lbs of food per cubic foot (0.9 to 1.35 kg per cubic meter) of freezer space]. Leave enough space in the freezer for air to circulate around packages. Be careful to leave enough room at the front so the door around packages can close tightly.

Food storage times will vary according to the quality and type of food, the type of packaging or wrap used (airtight and moisture-proof) and the storage temperature. Ice crystals inside a sealed package are normal. This simply means that moisture in the food and air inside the package have condensed, creating ice crystals.

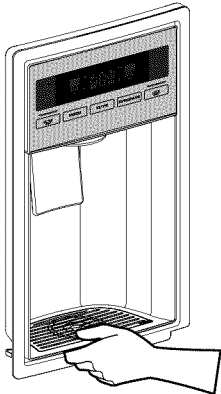
**NOTE:** Allow hot foods to cool at room temperature for 30 minutes, then package and freeze. Cooling hot foods before freezing saves energy.

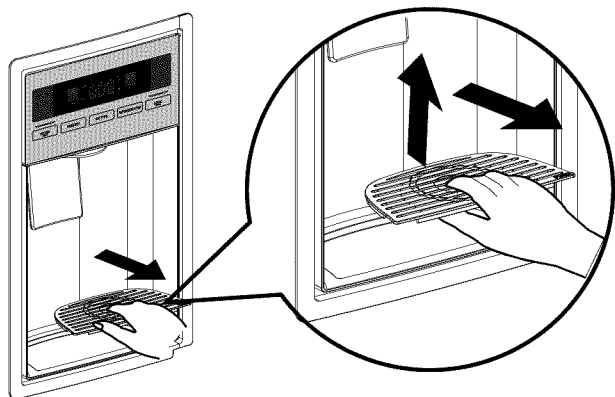
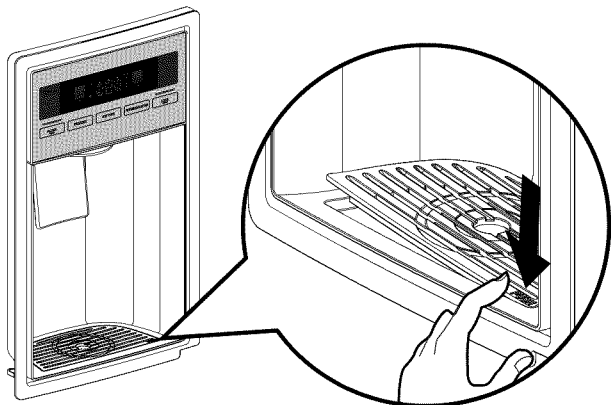
### WATER AND ICE DISPENSER

Your refrigerator has a mechanism that can dispense cool water and ice cubes without opening the door.

- The tray can easily be removed by pressing down and lifting it out.

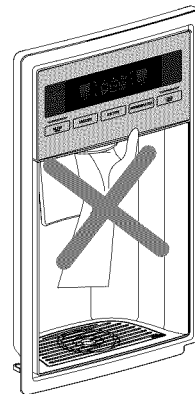


- First push the tray in the area labeled 'PUSH', then place your finger in the center hole and lift up to remove the tray.



### ⚠ WARNING

Do not put your hands into the water and ice dispenser opening. Doing so may cause an injury to your hand.

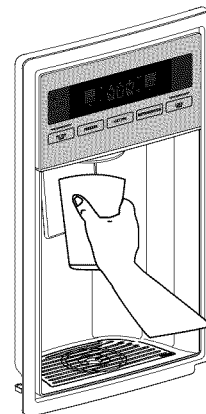

When using the dispenser with a container with a small opening, place the container as close to the top as possible.

- The dispenser has the following dimensions:

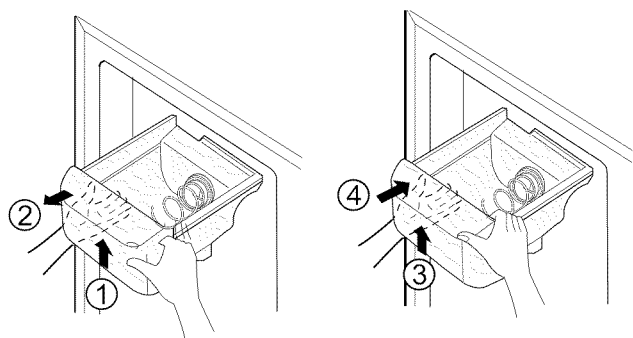

## ICE STORAGE BIN

The ice bin stores the ice cubes made by the ice maker. If you need to remove the ice storage bin, do so as follows:

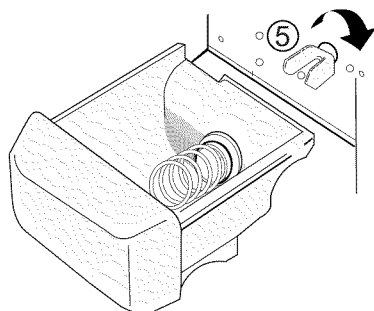
**NOTE:** Use both hands to remove the ice bin to avoid dropping it. If the ice bin does not slide into place easily, twist the drive device slightly.

- Hold the ice storage bin as shown in the left figure lift it ① while slightly pulling it out ②.



- To assemble the ice storage bin, lift it ③ while slightly pushing it in ④.

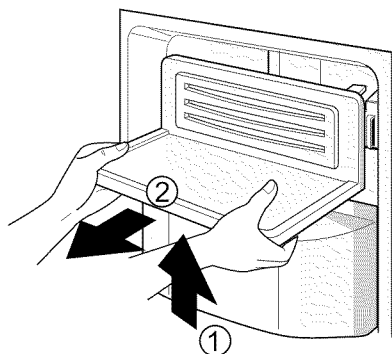
**NOTE:** Make sure the bin is fully engaged into the auger drive ⑤. If not, rotate the auger drive in the direction shown by the arrow until they bin is fully engaged into the auger drive.

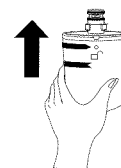
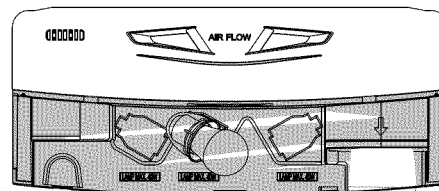
### Removing the water filter:

1. For first-time installation, remove filter substitute cap (A) by turning it counterclockwise a quarter turn and pulling it down. **The substitute cap must be retained for the future. If the filter is removed and not replaced, it is necessary to reinstall the substitute cap to prevent water leaks from the filter housing.**



### Installing the water filter

Remove red cap from the filter and insert the two tabs on the filter tip into the two slots in the refrigerator filter receptacle. You should feel the filter entering completely. Turn the filter to the right a quarter turn clockwise to lock it into place. The lock symbol will be lined up with the indicator arrow.



### After installing water filter:

1. Replace the shelf to the initial position.
2. Dispense 2.5 gallons (9.46 L) of water to purge the system, depressing and releasing the dispenser button (30 seconds ON, 60 seconds OFF). Open the refrigerator door and check the shelf area for leaks.
3. After installing filter, turn on household water supply.

## CARE AND CLEANING

### **⚠ WARNING**



#### **Explosion Hazard**

Use non-flammable cleaner.  
Failure to do so can result in death, explosion, or fire.

Both the refrigerator and freezer sections defrost automatically. However, clean both sections about once a month to prevent odors. Wipe up spills immediately.

### **GENERAL CLEANING TIPS**

- Unplug refrigerator or disconnect power.
- Remove all removable parts, such as shelves, crispers, etc. Refer to sections in Using Your Refrigerator for removal instructions.
- Use a clean sponge or soft cloth and a mild detergent in warm water. Do not use abrasive or harsh cleaners.
- Hand wash, rinse and dry all surfaces thoroughly.
- Plug in refrigerator or reconnect power.

### **OUTSIDE**

Waxing external painted metal surfaces helps provide rust protection. Do not wax plastic parts. Wax painted metal surfaces at least twice a year using appliance wax (or auto paste wax). Apply wax with a clean, soft cloth.

Do not use wax stainless steel exteriors. Use a product specially designed for polishing stainless steel appliances, or clean with a soft cloth or clean sponge and a mild detergent dissolved in warm water. Dry thoroughly with a soft cloth.

**NOTE:** Avoid door surface contact with chemical products that contain Phosphate or Chlorine.

### **INSIDE WALLS (allow freezer to warm up so cloth will not stick)**

To help remove odors, you can wash the inside of the refrigerator with a mixture of baking soda and warm water. Mix 2 tablespoons baking soda to 1 quart of water (26 g soda to 1 liter water.) Be sure the baking soda is completely dissolved so it does not scratch the surfaces of the refrigerator.

### **DOOR LINERS AND GASKETS**

Do not use cleaning waxes, concentrated detergent, bleaches, or cleaners containing petroleum on plastic refrigerator parts.  
Use a clean sponge or soft cloth and a mild detergent in warm water. Wash, rinse and dry all surfaces thoroughly.

### **PLASTIC PARTS (covers and panels)**

Do not use window sprays, abrasive cleaners, or flammable fluids. These can scratch or damage the material. Use a clean sponge or soft cloth and a mild detergent in warm water. Wash, rinse and dry all surfaces thoroughly.

### **BACK COVER**

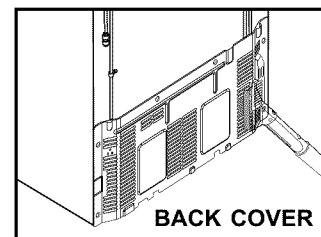
### **⚠ WARNING**

#### **ELECTRICAL SHOCK HAZARD**

Before you begin, either unplug the refrigerator or turn off power at the circuit breaker or fuse box. Failure to do so could result in death or serious injury.

**NOTE:** Back cover should only be removed by a qualified technician.

Clean the vents on the back cover. Use a vacuum cleaner with the brush attachment, at least twice a year to keep your refrigerator working efficiently.



### **LAMP REPLACEMENT**

### **⚠ WARNING**

#### **Electrical Shock Hazard**

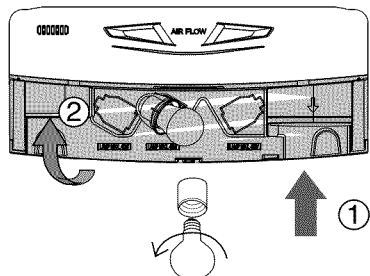
Before replacing a burned-out light bulb, either unplug the refrigerator or turn off power at the circuit breaker or fuse box.

**NOTE:** Not all appliance bulbs will fit your refrigerator. Be sure to replace the bulb with one of the same size, shape and wattage.

## CARE AND CLEANING

### To change the refrigerator and freezer lamp:

1. Unplug the refrigerator.
2. Remove the cover lamp by pressing upward on bottom ① and rotating outward ②.
3. Remove the bulb with a counterclockwise movement.
4. Replace with 40 watt (maximum) appliance bulb.
5. Reinstall cover lamp and plug again the refrigerator.



### POWER INTERRUPTIONS

1. If the power will be out for 24 hours or less, keep all refrigerator doors closed to help foods stay cold and frozen.
2. If the power will be out for more than 24 hours:
  - a) Remove all frozen food and store it in a frozen food locker.

**OR**

  - b) Place 2 lbs. (1 kg) of dry ice in the freezer for every cubic foot (28 L) of freezer space. This will keep the food frozen for two to four days. While handling dry ice, wear gloves to protect your hands from frostbite.

## ⚠ WARNING

### Suffocation Hazard

When using dry ice, provide adequate ventilation. Dry ice is frozen carbon dioxide ( $\text{CO}_2$ ). When it vaporizes, it can displace oxygen, causing dizziness, light-headedness, unconsciousness and death by suffocation. Open a window and do not breathe the vapors.

**OR**

- c) If neither a food locker nor dry ice is available, consume or dispose of food at once.

**REMEMBER:** In a power failure, a full freezer stays cold longer than a partially filled one. If you see that food contains ice crystals, it may be adversely affected. If the condition of the food is poor, or if you feel it is unsafe, dispose of it.

## ⚠ WARNING

• **DO NOT** refreeze frozen foods which have thawed completely. The United States Department of Agriculture in Home and Garden Bulletin No. 69 says:  
...You may safely refreeze frozen foods that have thawed if they still contain ice crystals or if they are still cold (below 39 °F).  
...Thawed ground meats, poultry or fish that have any off-odor or off-color should not be frozen and should not be eaten.  
Thawed ice cream should be discarded. If the odor or color of any food is poor or questionable, dispose of it. The food may be dangerous to eat.  
Even partial thawing and refreezing reduces the eating quality of foods, particularly fruits, vegetables and prepared foods.  
The eating quality of red meats is affected less than that of many other foods. Use refrozen foods as soon as possible to save as much of their quality as you can.

### WHEN YOU GO ON VACATION

**If you choose to leave the refrigerator ON while you are away,** follow these steps to prepare your refrigerator before you leave.

1. Use up any perishables and freeze other items.
2. Empty the ice bin.
3. Turn **OFF** the Icemaker. **NOTE:** If the ambient temperature will drop below freezing, have a qualified service technician drain the water supply system (on some models) to prevent serious property damage due to possible flooding from ruptured water lines or connections.

**If you choose to turn the refrigerator OFF before you leave,** follow these steps.

1. Remove all food from the refrigerator and empty ice bin.
2. Unplug refrigerator.
3. Clean refrigerator, wipe, and dry well.
4. Tape rubber or wood blocks to the tops of both doors to prop them open far enough for air to get in. This stops odor and mold from building up.

### WHEN YOU MOVE

When you are moving your refrigerator to a new home, follow these steps to prepare it for the move.

1. Remove all food from the refrigerator and pack all frozen food in dry ice.
2. Unplug refrigerator.
3. Clean refrigerator, wipe, and dry well.
4. Empty water from the defrost pan.
5. Clean, wipe and dry thoroughly.

## CARE AND CLEANING

6. Take out all removable parts, wrap them well and tape together so they don't shift and rattle during the move. Refer to sections in Using your Refrigerator for removal instructions.
7. Depending on the model, raise the front of the refrigerator so it rolls more easily OR screw in the leveling legs all the way so they don't scrape the floor. See the **DOOR ALIGNMENT** section.
8. Tape the doors shut and tape the power cord to the refrigerator cabinet.

When you get to your new home, put everything back and refer to the **REFRIGERATION INSTALLATION** section for setup instructions.

### WHEN SHOULD YOU SET THE ICEMAKER POWER SWITCH TO (OFF)

- When the water supply will be shut off for several hours.
- When the ice storage bin is removed for more than a minute or two.
- When the refrigerator will not be used for several days.

### NORMAL SOUNDS YOU MAY HEAR

- The icemaker water valve will buzz as the icemaker fills with water. If the power switch is in the **ON** position, it will buzz even if it has not yet been hooked up to water. To stop the buzzing, move the power switch to **OFF** position.

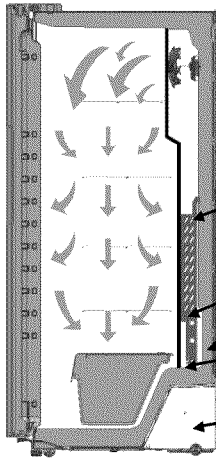
**NOTE:** Keeping the power switch in the **ON** position before the water line is connected can damage the icemaker.

- You will hear the sound of cubes dropping into the bin and water running in the pipes as the icemaker refills.

# TROUBLESHOOTING GUIDE

## UNDERSTANDING SOUNDS YOU MAY HEAR

Your new refrigerator may make sounds that your old one did not make. Because the sounds are new to you, you might be concerned about them. Most of the new sounds are normal. Hard surfaces, like the floor, walls and cabinets, can make the sounds seem louder than they actually are. The following list describes the kinds of sounds and what may be making them.



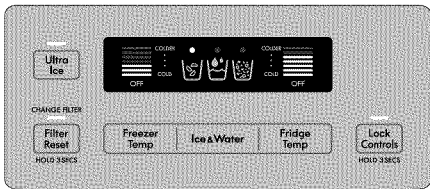
- The defrost timer will click when the automatic defrost cycle begins and ends. The thermostat control (or refrigerator control, depending on the model) will also click when cycling on and off.
- Rattling noises may come from the flow of refrigerant, the water line, or items stored on top of the refrigerator.
- Your refrigerator is designed to run more efficiently to keep your food items at the desired temperature. The high efficiency compressor may cause your new refrigerator to run longer than your old one, and you may hear a pulsating or high-pitched sound.
- You may hear the evaporator fan motor circulating the air through the refrigerator and freezer compartments.
- As each cycle ends, you may hear a gurgling sound due to the refrigerant flowing in your refrigerator.
- Contraction and expansion of the inside walls may cause a popping noise.
- Water dripping on the defrost heater during a defrost cycle may cause a sizzling sound.
- You may hear air being forced over the condenser by the condenser fan.
- You may hear water running into the drain pan during the defrost cycle.

## REFRIGERATOR DOES NOT OPERATE

Check if...

Then...

The power supply cord is unplugged.	Firmly plug the cord into a live outlet with proper voltage.
A household fuse has blown or circuit breaker tripped.	Replace the fuse or reset the circuit breaker.
Refrigerator is in the defrost cycle.	Wait about 30 minutes for defrost cycle to end.
Display shows the word OFF (Identify your control type).	The refrigerator control has been put into the store Demo (Demonstration) Mode The Demonstration Mode disables the cooling system, only lamps and display work normally. To disable Demo Mode open one door, then press Ultra Ice and Fridge Temp buttons at the same time for 5 seconds. When Demo Mode is deactivated, you will see the previous value setting you had on display.



## VIBRATION OR RATTLING NOISE

Check if...

Then...

The refrigerator is not resting solidly on the floor.	Floor is weak or uneven or leveling legs need adjusting. See <b>DOOR ALIGNMENT</b> Section.

## LIGHTS DO NOT WORK

Check if...

Then...

The power supply cord is unplugged.	Firmly plug the cord into a live outlet with proper voltage.
Light bulb is loose in the socket.	Turn the refrigerator control to the OFF position and unplug the refrigerator. Gently remove the bulb and reinsert. Then plug in refrigerator and reset the refrigerator control.

## TROUBLESHOOTING GUIDE

### LAMPS DO NOT WORK

Check if...

Then...

Light bulb has burned out.	Replace with an appliance bulb of the same wattage, size and shape available at your local hardware store. (See the <b>LAMP REPLACEMENT</b> section.) Turn the temperature control to the OFF position and unplug the refrigerator prior to replacement.
----------------------------	---

### COMPRESSOR MOTOR SEEMS TO RUN TOO MUCH

Check if...

Then...

The refrigerator that was replaced was an older model.	Modern refrigerators with more storage space require more operating time.
The room temperature is hotter than normal.	The motor will run longer under warm conditions. At normal room temperatures, expect your motor to run about 40% to 80% of the time. Under warmer conditions, expect it to run even more often. These model is still more energy efficient than previous models.
The door is opened often or a large amount of food has just been added.	Adding food and opening the door warms the refrigerator. It is normal for the refrigerator to run longer in order to cool the refrigerator back down. Adding a large amount of food warms the refrigerator. See the <b>FOOD STORAGE GUIDE</b> Section. In order to conserve energy, try to get everything you need out of the refrigerator at once, keep food organized so it is easy to find and close the door as soon as the food is removed.
The refrigerator was recently plugged in and the refrigerator control was set correctly	The refrigerator will take up to 24 hours to cool completely.
The refrigerator control was not set correctly for the surrounding conditions.	See the <b>ADJUSTING CONTROL SETTINGS</b> Section.
The doors are not closed completely.	Push the doors firmly shut. If they will not shut all the way, see <b>Doors Will Not Close Completely</b> below.
The condenser coils are dirty.	This prevents air transfer and makes the motor work harder. Clean the condenser coils. Refer to the <b>CARE AND CLEANING</b> section.

### DOORS WILL NOT CLOSE COMPLETELY

Check if...

Then...

The refrigerator is not level.	See the <b>REFRIGERATOR INSTALLATION AND DOOR ALIGNMENT</b> section to level refrigerator.
Food packages are blocking the door open.	Rearrange food containers to clear door and door shelves.
The ice bin, crisper cover, pans, shelves, door bins or baskets are out of position.	Push bins all the way in and put crisper cover, pans, shelves and baskets into their correct positions. See the <b>USING YOUR REFRIGERATOR</b> Section.
The gaskets are sticking.	Clean gaskets and the surface that they touch. Rub a thin coat of paraffin wax on the gaskets after cleaning.

## TROUBLESHOOTING GUIDE

### THE ICEMAKER IS NOT PRODUCING ICE OR ICE CUBES ARE FREEZING TOO SLOWLY

Check if...	Then...
The freezer temperature is cold enough to produce ice.	Wait 24 hours after hook-up for ice production. See the <b>CONTROL PANEL FEATURES</b> section.
Door left open.	Check to see if something is holding the door open.

### CUBES PRODUCED BY ICEMAKER ARE TOO SMALL

Check if...	Then...
Water shutoff valve connecting refrigerator to water line may be clogged.	Call a plumber to clear the valve.

### THE DOORS ARE DIFFICULT TO OPEN

Check if...	Then...
The gaskets are dirty or sticky.	Clean gaskets and the surfaces that they touch. Rub a thin coat of appliance polish or paraffin wax on the gaskets after cleaning.
The door is reopened within a short time after having been opened.	When you open the door, warmer air enters the refrigerator. As the warm air cools, it can create a vacuum. If the door is hard to open, wait 5 minutes to allow the air pressure to equalize, then see if it opens more easily.

### AUTOMATIC ICEMAKER DOES NOT WORK

Check if...	Then...
Icemaker power switch in the <b>O (off)</b> position.	Move the switch to the <b>I (on)</b> position.
Water supply turned off or not connected.	See the <b>CONNECTING THE WATER LINE</b> section.
Freezer compartment too warm.	Wait 24 hours for the freezer to reach its ideal temperature.
Piled up cubes in the storage bin cause the icemaker to shut off.	Level cubes by hand or shake the bin occasionally.

### TEMPERATURE IS TOO WARM OR THERE IS INTERIOR MOISTURE BUILDUP

Check if...	Then...
The air vents are blocked. Cold air circulates from the freezer to the fresh food section and back again through air vents in the wall dividing the two sections.	Locate air vents by using your hand to sense airflow and move all packages that block vents and restrict airflow. Refer to <b>ENSURING PROPER AIR CIRCULATION</b> section for the location of air vents.

## TROUBLESHOOTING GUIDE

### TEMPERATURE IS TOO WARM OR THERE IS INTERIOR MOISTURE BUILDUP (CONTINUED)

Check if...	Then...
The doors are opened often.	When the door is opened, warm humid air is allowed into the refrigerator. The more the door is opened, the faster the humidity builds up, and the more warm air the refrigerator must cool. In order to keep the refrigerator cool, try to get everything you need out of the refrigerator at once, keep food organized so it is easy to find and close the door as soon as the food is removed.
The control is not set correctly for the surrounding conditions.	Refer to the <b>CONTROL PANEL FEATURES</b> section. Wait 24 hours for temperatures to stabilize or even out. If the temperature is too cold or too warm, adjust the setting one level at a time.
A large amount of food has just been added to the refrigerator or freezer.	Adding food warms the refrigerator. It can take a few hours for the refrigerator to return to normal temperature.
The food is not packaged correctly.	Wrap food tightly and wipe off damp containers prior to storing in the refrigerator to avoid moisture accumulation. If necessary, repack food according to the guidelines in the <b>FOOD STORAGE GUIDE</b> section.
The doors are not closing completely.	See <b>Doors Will Not Close Completely</b> .
The weather is humid.	In humid weather, air carries moisture into refrigerator when doors are opened.
A self-defrost cycle was completed.	It is normal for droplets to form on the back wall after the refrigerator self-defrosts.

### DOORS WILL NOT CLOSE COMPLETELY

Check if...	Then...
The refrigerator wobbles or seems unstable.	Level the refrigerator. Refer to the <b>DOOR ALIGNMENT</b> section.
The doors were removed during product installation and not properly replaced.	Remove and replace the doors according to the <b>REMOVING AND REPLACING REFRIGERATOR DOORS</b> section, or call qualified service technician.

### FROST OR ICE CRYSTALS ON FROZEN FOOD

Check if...	Then...
The door is not closing properly.	See <b>Doors Will Not Close Completely</b> above.
The door is opened often.	When the door is opened, warm, humid air is allowed in the freezer resulting in frost.

## TROUBLESHOOTING GUIDE

### ICE HAS OFF-TASTE OR ODOR

Check if...

Then...

The icemaker was recently installed.	Discard first few batches of ice to avoid discolored or off-flavored ice.
The ice has been stored for too long.	Throw away old ice and make new supply.
The food has not been wrapped tightly in either compartment.	Rewrap foods since odors may migrate to the ice if food is not wrapped properly.
The water supply contains minerals such as sulfur.	A new filter may need to be installed to eliminate taste and odor problems.
The interior of refrigerator needs cleaning.	See <b>CARE AND CLEANING</b> section.
Ice storage bin needs cleaning.	Empty and wash bin. Discard old cubes.

### THERE IS WATER IN THE DEFROST DRAIN PAN

Check if...

Then...

The refrigerator is defrosting.	The water will evaporate. It is normal for water to drip into the defrost pan.
It is more humid than normal.	Expect that the water in the defrost pan will take longer to evaporate. This is normal when it is hot or humid.

### THE REFRIGERATOR SEEMS TO MAKE TOO MUCH NOISE

Check if...

Then...

The sounds may be normal for your refrigerator.	Refer to the <b>UNDERSTANDING SOUNDS YOU MAY HEAR</b> section.
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
